Why ask hard questions about the bible?

- № 1 Peter 3:15 ESV "15 but in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect,
- We don't want people "falling away from the faith" because their questions were not heard.

Original Autographs

- We do not have the original autographs of the bible. The doctrine of inerrancy/infallibility is confined to the original autographs, however.
- We have over 5, 700 Greek NT manuscripts. Other classical texts don't even come close to the NT!



Why study manuscripts?



- Scholars make mistakes that can be corrected. A famous discovery of P52 did just that!
- № P52's date ranges from 125-175. Our oldest manuscript in existence.
- Many liberal German New Testament scholars were dating John's gospel in the late 2nd (180-200) A.D. The discovery of P52 proved this was wrong!

Tischendorf





- ₹ Tischendorf discovered the greatest codex, named "Sinaiticus" or "Aleph".
- ⋈ He was hanging out one nigh at St. Catherine's monastery and he noticed that monks were burning very old paper.
- № He smuggled codex Sinaiticus out of Egypt and preserved it.

Case Study: Mark 16:9-20

- № 16:9-20 includes several words that Mark doesn't use throughout his gospel.
- tongues", "pick up serpents", and "drink deadly poison that will not hurt them".


- Three options for what happened. They are that Mark never finished his gospel, "for they were afraid" is the proper ending, or the true ending was lost.
- Representation Pastor Doug's view? I believe it is most likely (not a slam dunk) that Mark ended his gospel with "for they were afraid".
- Asks the question to the reader of Mark. How will you respond to the resurrection of Jesus Christ? Open ended nature is just like Jonah!

Case Study: John 7:53-8:11

- Lack of early manuscripts with this story is overwhelming.
- It interrupts the flow of the narrative of the gospel of John. It doesn't fit internally.
- Note Throughout all of our manuscripts, it is found everywhere. For example, it is found at the end of Luke and all over the place in John's gospel.

Kyle Hughes

- № My roommate in seminary published a paper in a prestigious journal arguing that this passage is from the "L" material.
- № The story is powerful and part of the oral tradition. The church wanted to place it somewhere in the NT.
- This explains why it is found it so many different places within the manuscripts.

King James bible

- Based on Byzantine text tradition. This
 is a much later tradition than the best
 modern translations use such as the
 NIV, ESV, and many others.
