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
WEEK ONE: THEOLOGY OF MISSION


DEFINITION OF GIFTS IN ANTIQUITY

 Priority: The focus is on the timing of the gift. It's emphasis is on the person who initiates the gift giving. Examples: parents and children, Reformed views of election (Predestination), and those who teach "prevenient grace."






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DEFINITION OF GIFTS IN ANTIQUITY

 Incongruity: Gift is given without regard to the worth of the recipient.

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


DEFINITION OF GIFTS IN ANTIQUITY

- Incongruity: Gift is given without regard to the worth of the recipient.
- Efficacy: The gift achieves what it was designed to do.



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DEFINITION OF GIFTS IN ANTIQUITY

 Non-Circularity: A gift that is given that escapes reciprocity.
I do not believe this is a biblical concept of gift giving.



VERTICAL GIFT GIVING

 We need to first start with the definition of "Vertical Gift Giving."



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VERTICAL GIFT GIVING

• I believe, as modern westerners, we presuppose the Bible teaches "non-reciprocity" with regards to responding to the gift of grace in Christ.

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VERTICAL GIFT GIVING


 Example: People will often say, "After you accept Christ, you can do whatever you want. It's a pure gift with no-strings attached." Except Paul states: "May we sin that grace may abound? May it never be! (Romans 6:1).



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TELOS OF GIFT GIVING


 Despite what people say, the ends (telos) always justifies the means. What is the telos of mission? God through our gifts building His kingdom.



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TELOS OF GIFT GIVING

 We need to view mission through a heavenly lens. Part of the problem is we have an earthly view of mission!





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
TELOS OF GIFT GIVING

 We need to get comfortable with how the church operates. In the words of Marva Dawn, what we do is a "royal waste of time" to those outside the church.

 God's grace and gift are rooted in the Hebrew bible. They just don't magically appear in the New Testament.





- Read Deuteronomy 6:1-25.



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
GIFT GIVING IN THE OT

• The giving of Torah is what could be called a sign-act. The sign is the saving event of God delivering His people. The act? Following Him through keeping the law and being daily reminded of Israel's covenant with God. The covenant is a means of grace (gift).






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GIFT GIVING IN THE NT

• Read Ephesians 2:1-10.

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


GIFT GIVING IN THE NT

- This text is all about the gift of God in Christ!



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GIFT GIVING IN THE NT

• Notice this text touches on the gift as priority (God's preordained knowledge), incongruity (disregard for worth of recipient), it's efficacious (does something!), and it does not fit into the box of "pure gift." It expects a return!

CHRISTIAN PRACTICE

 Every week, we have a practice that enacts this sign-act or sign-seal of grace when we participate in communion.





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CHRISTIAN PRACTICE

• The sign-act or sign-seal of communion reminds us of the gift of God in Christ week after week. We respond with a life of gratitude and service to Christ for what he has done for us.



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
CHRISTIAN PRACTICE

• All people in the church are conceived of as equals (Galatians 3:28-29). In many ways, all government projects, marketers, etc. are trying to imitate the gospel! But they cannot!






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HORIZONTAL GIFT GIVING

 We must think about how the vertical gift of Christ influences our horizontal practices as Christians.

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


HORIZONTAL GIFT GIVING

 In many ways I am challenging how Christians have thought about mission in the past.
I come from a wealthy,
Mt. Lebanon EPC, where we more or less just cut checks to less fortunate people, never expecting a return.



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HORIZONTAL GIFT GIVING

• We need to learn to see gifts as that which brings us into social bonds with brothers and sisters in Christ. This means, I think, we build bonds with people. We need to cast away the idea of gifts "without strings attached."

EXAMPLE: FOOD

 Text (Acts 2:42-47): Food creates social bonds. We could even say for early Christians, it was "sacramental."





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EXAMPLE: FOOD

 Missional friendship: Perhaps we could use food as a means to create social bonds whereby they open the door to share the gospel with others?



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EXAMPLE: FOOD

 Example: How often has somebody had us over for dinner and we responded by having them over? This demonstrates the reciprocity of gift giving and it's power to create social bonds.



 How is power exercised in the local church? Through service and gift giving to others. However, this is stated within a culture that does not believe in altruism.









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EXAMPLE: SERVICE

• Text: I Corinthians 12: I-31











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EXAMPLE: CHARISMAS

 The gifts, or charismas, that believers are given by the Holy Spirit (vertical gift) are not merited (12:1-11). They are graces given by the Lord.

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EXAMPLE: CHARISMAS

• What is the gift's purpose(12:12-31)? To create social bonds (horizontal) whereby the entire church is built up into one body.
